
The children also learnt more about the leisure industry and job opportunities in the sector. We are very grateful to the instructors, who shared their own experiences and education pathways.



WHY DISCUSS CAREERS NOW?

Although it may still seem a long way off, when you consider young people select their options in Year 9, discussing the different career options now allows them time to consider and reflect which options may interest them. Conversations about careers can also inspire confidence in their abilities and can increase their excitement about their future. A recent study showed childhood aspirations are an important driver of achievement later in life. And it also found that children's aspirations are shaped by parents' expectations. These discussions can also help develop learning about the world around them, broadening their aspirations and challenging stereotypes.

WHAT ARE MY CHOICES FROM YEAR 10 ONWARDS?



The most recent qualification, the T Level was introduced in 2020 and is less well known. Here is some information and a link to <u>Gov.uk</u> for a fuller explanation.



T Levels are an alternative to A levels, apprenticeships and other 16 to 19 courses. Equivalent in size to 3 A levels, a T Level focuses on vocational skills and can help students into skilled employment, higher study or apprenticeships.



Each T Level includes an in-depth industry placement that lasts at least 45 days. Students get valuable experience in the workplace; employers get early sight of the new talent in their industry.



T Level students spend 80% of the course in their learning environment, gaining the skills that employers need. The other 20% is a meaningful industry placement, where they put these skills into action.



POLITICS IN ACTION

Our Year 5 and 6 pupils enjoyed an interesting and engaging talk with local Conservative MP, Michael Tomlinson, who visited St. Michael's last term.

We gained an insight into the life of an MP in government and what a day in his working life looks like. He also told us more about what happens in Parliament and gave the children a further insight into the world of politics by seating them as if they were in the House of Commons.

Fortunately, no-one had to call for "Order!" as everyone was very well behaved!

THE SWEET SMELL OF SUCCESS—GUEST SPEAKER SIMON CONSTANTINE

We were delighted to welcome Simon Constantine to our school when he came to speak to Year 7 and 8 students about his career journey.

Simon is perhaps best known as the former head buyer and perfumer at Lush Cosmetics, before he moved



on to create the <u>'and' fragrance range</u>. He shared his passion for ethical buying and sustainability in his industry.
